Holy Saturday The In-Between Time

On Holy Saturday this year (March 30th), the day between Good Friday and Easter Sunday, we will be opening our worship space to experience a time dedicated to the "in-between time" from cross to empty tomb. We will gather in Apostles' sanctuary and spend some time in prayer, responsive reading and silence as we contemplate the mystery of the cross and what it means that the Word who became flesh died. It will be a time during which we may form questions, we may grieve, we may feel loss or loneliness or despair. We remember the full measure of the cross and the destruction it brings. In this "in-between time" we gather in the company of others and share support for each other in our own struggles with the cross. We look to God for some type of answer. We hope a hope that is beyond hope. Join us on Holy Saturday for this "In-Between Time" worship. We will gather at noon in the sanctuary and spend perhaps 45 minutes allowing the destruction of the cross and the darkness of the world enter into our Holy Time meditation. With the women who prepared the ointments, we will wait for the morning and all that it will bring.

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From Your Congregation Council President

As I begin my third year on Council and my second term as the Council president, I wanted to share a few thoughts on where we have been this past

year 2023, and where I hope we will go, as a congregation, in the year ahead, 2024. As I have written before, 2023 was a year of recovery and healing, and as a congregation, I think we have made great strides along the path of healing! We have been able to introduce some new worship opportunities in the form of Agape Meal services, allowing us to combine service with fellowship. The Agape Meal service format also lends itself very well to Sundays when we have congregational meetings planned so I would anticipate we will continue to consider those for the upcoming congregational meetings for 2024. We have also made great strides on offering learning opportunities in support of our Reconciling In Christ (RIC) commitment by offering Bias Training to the Council as well as an opportunity for the congregation. As part of that commitment, we have now started including Indigenous persons and have been looking at ways to educate ourselves on how we can recognize the Indigenous people that once occupied the lands where the church ow resides. A small group of us visited the Richmond Library for an exhibition on Indigenous Perspectives that was a great learning experience. I expect that we will continue to look for ways that we can educate ourselves in all aspects related to being an RIC congregation. We have also started on a Stewardship campaign to address the financial stewardship within the congregation, as the Seasons of Stewardship performed in 2022 and 2023 were focused on the giving of time and talents. Financial stewardship is also a part of stewardship and a necessity that cannot be avoided. After some very low times in late 2022 we have seen a modest increase in giving

since November of 2023 and I am hopeful that the financial stewardship campaign will allow us to see continued growth in our financial giving. thereby allowing us to continue our ministries that we provide to the congregation and the surrounding communities. I am thankful for such a caring congregation and expect that we will come together to meet our financial obligations and continue the support of our current ministries. Thank you all for your support over the past year and I look forward to serving you again in 2024. 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Thoughts on Stewardship "God is Good."

I remember my mother writing this in a letter to her aunt immediately after her aunt's husband, my mother's favorite

uncle, had passed. At the time I thought, "How can she write that God is good when someone you love dies?" My mother did not have an easy childhood. Her mother died when she was 5, leaving behind my mother and her younger brother, age 4. I have been told that her father, my grandfather, almost had a nervous break down after the death of his wife. Being a single parent is never easy but during the depression it could not have been an easy plight. Then, when my mother was 20, her beloved brother died very tragically, falling off a mountain in Yosemite while hiking with friends. It did not end there. There were additional tragic events in her adult life that were equally as impactful. We all know that there are many, many people who experience tragedies throughout their lives and do not turn their back on God. Their commitment to God and their church remains strong in spite of countless misfortunes in their life. As my mother passed away when I was an adolescent. I never had a chance to have a conversation about how she was able to sustain her faith through such heartbreaking events. What I have come to understand about her though, is that during the best of times and certainly during the worst of times, she leaned into and leaned onto her faith. How do we strengthen our faith? I know of no formula for a strong faith. We know that reading and understanding Scripture is important. We know that Holy Communion brings us closer to God. We know having a prayer life is important. For me, attending church is important as it helps to ground me and sustain me throughout the week. I also believe that when we share our time, our talents and our treasures (our money), we are investing in the life and mission of the congregation; one way to live out our faith by

serving Jesus in our community. For many of us, the easier part of this trifecta is sharing our time and talents; the more challenging part is often sharing our money. Americans like their money; what it can buy, where it can take us, and what it can access for us. For many, it is difficult to give our money to an entity in which we do not receive something material in return. Yet, that is the point to commit to something greater than ourselves without asking for anything in return because we already have God's grace and God's love. The Gospel of Matthew was spot on when he tells us in Chapter 6, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Linda Hodges
